A General Tribute to Departed Akoras, 2020

The year 2020 is one that none of us will forget in a hurry. It is the year that over 70 Akoras, who we know of, passed away. While we are reeling from the departure of these Akoras, we remain stunned by the effects of the Coronavirus pandemic, which has changed the way we do things. We have to accept this 'new normal' and its restrictions, however uncomfortable, in order to stay safe. Every facet of our lives has been affected, whether at school, at the workplace, markets and shops, eateries and other interactions with one another in public places. Sadly, even the churches have not been spared. Unfortunately, churches which are normally places of solace and refuge, could be potential hotspots; so we are urging everyone to observe the Covid-19 safety protocols which have been put in place for the good of all us. The social distancing in the pews should not change as the service goes on. Let us cover our noses and mouths with our masks and not wear them under our chins. Thank you very much.

There is an African proverb which goes like this: *Death is like a dress that at some point or another everyone has to wear*. Put in another way, *Death is the only certainty in life*. Having said that, the thought of more than 70 Akoras dying in the course of one year is unprecedented; not age 70, but the number 70. This means that in every month for the past 12 months, an average of 5 or 6 Akoras have died and that is a lot and very sad, especially when one knows most of them.

In the midst of it all, Akoras have been hit by the death of Akora President Jerry John Rawlings who was well known in the Akora community, nationally and internationally. Death has robbed us of another Akora Head of State, but we all know that "man proposes and God disposes". May his soul rest in peace!

GENERAL TRIBUTE TO DECEASED AKORAS

Even though we are jolted by the unusually large number of deceased Akoras, it might not necessarily be a result of lifestyle choices. We just need to take time out to do some individual reflection.

Akora Hilda Attoh Dedei Nettey of the 1938 Year Group was the oldest Akora who passed away at 103 years. She definitely lived a full life and touched many lives. But the youngest, Akora Maame Ekua Darkoa Darko was one of the freshest inductees into the OAA as a member of the 2019 Year Group, and she was only 19.

As we mourn those we have lost, and reflect on their lives, this provides us a good opportunity to reflect on our own lives also. We need to think about the legacies we would like to leave behind. We must not just build those legacies, but document them. When we take a look at the lives of those who have gone before us, we find a wide range of lives to draw inspiration from. From journalists and broadcasters to lawyers, accountants and military officers. A missionary or development consultant definitely impacted lives in places that we have neither heard of nor dreamt about. They all lived like true Achimotans by being living waters to a thirsty land, whether in a big way or in their own small way. They often lived up to the ideals that they were taught at Achimota School and made all of us proud. Not all of them were widely known, but they made an impact, one way or the other. Unfortunately some of the very young ones were yet to water the thirsty land when they passed away.

We lost Akoras Elizabeth Asafu-Adjaye, Juliet Al-Hassan and Charity Agbenyeke whose clothes' and accessories' designs made an impact locally and internationally. Akora Michael Sagoe-Baffoe was a different

kind of designer. He designed and built practical items for his workplace from things nobody wanted. Akora Thomas Mensah was an eminent jurist whose knowledge contributed in the resolution of Ghana's border dispute with la Cote d'Ivoire. Akora Gladys Adum Kwapong was a pacesetter by being the first woman principal of the Presbyterian Women's Training College at Aburi. Other Akoras who made an impact in education included Akora Olga Sekyiamah who taught and eventually headed a school; Akora Eleanor Oddoye, who taught and rose in the ranks of the education service; Akora Sophia Duker, who founded an early childhood school and run it for many years and Akora Owsald Amoo-Gottfried who was the founding father of Faith Montessorri School. How can one comprehend losing three engineers in a short space of time: Akora Wilson Kobla Agbemava, a mining engineer; Akora Patrick Kwadjo Baah, a mechanical engineer and Akora Wilfred Edwin Owusu Apatu, a civil engineer. On a peronsal note, I felt Akora Apatu's loss very deeply because of his quiet, but constant presence at OAA Reps' meetings and his deep contributions to discussions.

One of my many Akora predecessors, Daniel Adzei Bekoe, former Vice Chancellor of University of Ghana, and the other educationists imparted knowledge in the course of their work as we expected of them. We have simply lost too many of them this year, and I can go on and on. But let us be comforted that we saw them and heard them when it mattered.

We shall continue to pray for the souls of all departed Akoras in the sure hope that we will all meet again on the Resurrection Day. May their souls Rest in Peace!

Akora Daniel Adzei Bekoe was born on 7th December, 1928 at Abokobi. He was educated at Teshie Presbyterian School, Achimota College (1943 to 1948), University College of the Gold Coast and University of Oxford. He worked at the University of California at Los Angeles, University of Ibadan and University of Ghana, Legon. At the University of Ghana, he became Hall Master, Dean of Faculty and Vice Chancellor. He served in various roles throughout his life, including: Chief Examiner, Chemistry, West African Examinations Council, Member, Ghana Atomic Energy Commission, Chairman, Tema Development Corporation, President, International Council of Scientific Unions, Member, Pontifical Academy of Sciences, Director, UNESCO Regional Office of Science and Technology for Africa, Director, Canadian International Development Research Centre, Eastern and Southern Africa, President, Ghana Academy of Arts and Sciences, Council Chairman, Presbyterian University College, Chairman, Council of State, Republic of Ghana, Senior Research Fellow, Institute of Economic Affairs.

Akora Thomas A. Mensah (Year Group 1951, former OAA UK President 2009 - 2012) was a former Assistant Secretary-General at the United Nations International Maritime Organization (IMO). A First Class degree graduate of the University of Ghana, he obtained a Master of Laws and Doctorate from Yale University Law School, and his career included distinguished academic posts in Ghana, Sweden, and Hawaii. Following his appointment as the first High Commissioner of Ghana to South Africa in 1995, Judge Mensah was appointed to the International Tribunal for the Law of the Sea and elected as the first President in 1996. H.E. Judge Mensah was the recipient of numerous awards including the prestigious International Maritime Prize 2012 and was inducted into the Maritime Hall of Fame in New York in 1998. As an international dispute resolution specialist, H.E. Judge Mensah was an arbitrator on high-profile international cases and wrote extensively on the Law of the Sea and International Environmental Law. Judge Mensah is survived by his wife, Akora Akosua Mensah, his children, grandchildren and great-grandson.



Akora Sir Knight Dr. Michael Kofi Kusi also popularly known as MK belonged to the 1951 Year Group. He entered the Outlaw's Hill in 1947 and was in Aggrey House. In 1953 he was granted a scholarship to study in Germany. He completed his first degree in Tuebingen, and Second Degree in Muenich, Germany. In 1960 He married Akora Elizabeth Akua Ado-bea Kusi née Aklaku also of the 1953 Year Group and they had 5 children and 3 grandchildren. In 1972, Akora Kusi specialized in surgery and urology in Hamburg and Hannover, Germany, respectively. He was Surgeon-in-Charge of Kpando Roman Catholic Hospital from 1972 to 1975. In 1975 he founded Siloam Hospital in Kumasi together with his wife.

Akora Elizabeth Oheneba Akua Agyemang Asafu-Adjaye was born in Kumasi on 2nd August 1933 to Madam Elizabeth Osei Tutu of Chiraa George Gray Asafu-Adjaye of Bamang. She started her education at Methodist Infant-Junior School, Mbrom, Methodist Girls' School, Asawasi, and Mmofraturu Girls' Boarding School all in Kumasi. She attended Achimota School from 1949 to 1952 and continued her education in London. Even though she studied dressmaking and millinery she worked as a secretary at Ghana High Commission, London where she met her future husband Richard Abusuayedom Quarshie. In 1959 she set up a dressmaking business as well as importing readymade dresses alongside bringing up her sons and nephew. Akora Elizabeth's business acumen enabled her to support her adolescent sons through school. She joined Ghana Congress on Evangelization (GHACOE), a Women's Ministry and became its District and Regional Presidents in the '80s and '90s. She is survived by her five sons.

Akora Eleanor Atta Panyin Oddoye née Asante was born on the 27th of June, 1933. She was educated at the Government Girls School, Accra, Achimota School Class of 1952 and the University of Worcester in the UK. She spent most of her working life in the field of education and is mostly remembered for her service to the St. Mary's Senior High School, Korle Gonno (1962-1991) where she was home science mistress and head of department. She retired in 1991 as an Assistant Director of Education. She



was an active member of the 1952 Year Group. She passed on after a short illness on the 21st of December, 2019. She is survived by her five children Mr. D Kofi Asante, Rev Canon O K Oddoye, Mr. Michael O K Oddoye, Bishop Dr. Hamish V A Oddoye and Mrs. Maryanne O Odei.

Akora Wilson Kobla Agbemava was born at Shama in the Western Region in or around 1932 to Mr. Kuyorna Agbemava and Madam Korshiwor Dziekpor all of blessed memory. He started his primary education at the Roman Catholic primary School, Atorkor in 1941 through Anloga EP Middle School in 1947. He sat for the Achimota School entrance examination at the A.M.E Zion school at Keta in 1948 and passed with flying colours and was subsequently awarded the Director of Education Scholarship which saw him through Achimota School from 1949-55. He was a prefect of Gyamfi House and a keen athlete, running track and field and swimming. He attended the University of Newcastle Upon Tyne where he trained as a mining engineer. Akora Agbemava's whole working career was with the Ghana Consolidated Diamonds Ltd formerly CAST, Akwatia. He passed away on the 4th of December, 2019 aged 87 years. May he rest in perfect peace.

Akora Eastritia Maud Ennin née Coke, was born in Cape Coast on April 17, 1938 to Mr. Richard and Mrs. Hannah Coke. She attended Wesley Girls' Primary School, Cape Coast then to Achimota School in 1951. She resided in Clark House and was a monitress. Akora Eastritia was good at hockey, netball and swimming and was made Girls' Sports Prefect. She was also a member of Drama Student Productions. She studied accounting in London and worked as a banker till she got married to Dr. Claud Ennin in Ghana. Akora Eastritia was a good mother to Claud's children from his previous marriage and her own three. When husband was Ghana's ambassador to Ivory Coast and her etiquette and entertaining skills came to play making her a good hostess. She is missed by all who were touched by her. She passed away on 28th July 2020 survived by her loving children and grandchildren.



Akora Olga June Sekyiamah née Buckle of the 1958 Year Group was born on 12th June 1939. She attended Achimota School and was in Kingsley House. She had her sixth form education at Aburi Girls and studied Liberal Arts at the University of Ghana. In pursuit of a teaching career, she gained a Diploma in Education at Cape Coast University and studied Teaching of English as a Second Language (TESOL) at Hunter College in New York. Her teaching career took her to Accra Girls Secondary School, Accra High School and Nungua Secondary School where she became the Headmistress until her retirement. Olga was married to Ambassador Kofi Sekyiamah. Their Diplomatic pursuits took them to Tanzania, the United Nations (UN), Belgium, Australia and New Zealand.

Akora Kwadwo Owusu of the 1957 Year Group entered Achimota School in 1953, rather small in stature like Akoras Sylvanus Kwetey, Annan Cato, Anquandah and Walter W Bannerman but boisterous. He played hockey for Cadbury House and the School. He continued playing after school with Akoras Agbo, and Dake. Akora Owusu studied medicine in the UK to the surprise of all. He qualified as a surgeon and became one of 16 medical doctors in the 1957 Year Group. He lectured at Korle Bu Hospital then went on to work at Cocoa Clinic until he retired. He loved to play table tennis too. Akora Owusu was generous to a fault even when he was unwell. He passed away survived by his children and their mothers.

Akora Samuel Kwame Tokploe Dake of 1957 Year Group was born on Saturday, 31st July, 1937, to Cephas Kwasi Darkeh (of the Royal Tokploe Dake family) and Yoherbert Atawa Gbortsu, of Kpeve, Volta Region. He entered Achimota School in 1953, finishing the Fifth Form in 1957 and the Upper Sixth Form in 1959, obtaining the West African Higher School Certificate. He was in Aggrey House. He was the first Dining Hall Prefect. In 1963, he gained an Honours Degree (Bachelor of Science, Economics) from the University of Ghana, Legon and worked Messrs. R. T. Briscoe; National Industrial

Company and Ghamot (now Toyota Ghana). He finally became a private Management Consultant. He was married Akora Florence Brigitte Yawa Dake nee Agbettoh of Kingsley House who predeceased him. Akora Dake passed away on 11th March 2020, survived his children Florence, Foriwa, Senyo and Eric.

Akor Grace Sybil Naa Akuyea Longdon (Araa) was born on 24th August 1940 to Mr. James Owuraku and Mrs Ellen Halm-Addo née Brunger. She attended Methodist Girls' School, Achimota School and sat for her GCEs in 1958. She continued her education in Edinburgh where she studied Domestic Science and proceeded to Glasgow and West of Scotland College of Domestic Science nicknamed The Dough School, now known as the Queens College, where she studied Dietetics. She practised briefly in Glasgow and returned to Ghana in 1968. Akora Grace worked for the Ministry of Health and was posted to Effia Nkwanta Hospital, Sekondi in 1969 until she was transferred to Korle Bu Teaching Hospital in 1972 where she worked until she retired. She is survived by her husband Charles Brew Longdon and four children Charles, Sara, Amanda and Wilma and seven grandchildren, Zoe, Joel, Jason, Nana Aba, Yeokow, Akyedzie and Shanti.

Akor Joseph Edwin Opong-Sampong, was born at Abetifi Kwahu on January 3, 1940 to Adelaide Opong and Jacob Kwakye Opong. He started his education at the local Presbyterian School at Abetifi, and continued at the various places in the then Gold Coast where his father was transferred. He gained admission to Achimota School in 1954 and resided at Livingston House. He was a member of the Cadet Corps and served on the school's journal as a reporter. He played cricket and was active in other sporting activities. Akora Opong-Sampong worked with Ghana Broadcasting Corporation in as a news reader and assistant editor. He went on a study tour of British Broadcasting Corporation. He used his knowledge in journalism to sustain his year group which was referred to as the *Dynamic 1959 Group*. He was their secretary till his demise. He passed away on 5th October 2019 survived by his daughters Linda, Sandra and Sheila and 9 grandchildren.



Akora Robert Kafui Agudetse was born on the 29th April, 1941, baptized into the Evangelical Presbyterian Church and later joined the Assemblies of God Church in Sakumono Estates. He had his primary and middle school education in the Volta Region, before entering Achimota School in 1956. He resided in Livingstone House. He joined the School Cadet Corps and had the opportunity of participating in the Independence Celebration in 1957. He learnt to be a team player through activities such as games and sports leading to him ending up as a football and hockey player throughout his life at Achimota and beyond. Akora Agudetse was commissioned into the Ghana Armed Forces on 8th October, 1961. He took up all military courses in line with his rank at every point and held several appointments. He was honorably discharged from the service on 22nd October, 1982.
