GENERAL TRIBUTE

Good morning, Akoras, Families and Friends...

Today, we gather with heavy hearts to pay tribute to our beloved Akoras who have left us from October 2022 to October 2023. Each one, whether known closely or from a distance, held a special place in our Akora family and in our hearts ... and their loss is keenly felt across the globe.

To the families and friends touched by these departures, we embrace you with the condolences of the entire Akora Nation. When we reflect on the lives that have gone out of our sight we realise the impact they had on our lives, no matter how minor or major and regardless of duration.

We had the opportunity in January 2022 to celebrate Akora Rosina Attoh Korkoi Konuah when she turned 100 years as one of the first two Ghanaian female pharmacists who broke that glass ceiling, and paved the way for future generations of women to follow into that profession. She sadly left us about a year and a half later.

From the loss of our centenarian Akora Rosina at the top of the list, unfortunately comes a Gen-Z at the bottom of the list by age, Akora Emmanuel Nhyira Kwadwo Gyebi. He had his whole life ahead of him and we can only guess what he would have become. According to his mates he had very impressive graphic designing skills which our School utilized for publicity materials for Speech and Prize-Giving Day and SRC celebrations among others. We lost two more multi-talented artists from the 1980s and early 2000s namely Akora Kojo Yeboah Boafo and Akora Andy Nii Akashie (OJ Blaq). Their potential was painfully cut short.



Back to the top of the list by age, several scientists from 1946 to 1956 bowed out of this life. These Akoras were much-celebrated both at home and abroad. They were Akora Dr. Letitia Obeng, Akora Emeritus Professor Samuel Ofosu-Amaah, Akora Edward Ayensu and Akora Domingo Baëta. A building at the Physics Department of the University of Ghana was named after the celebrated physicist Akora Baëta.

As many as five accountants of various ages answered the exit call.

They contributed their quota to the business world and still had more to give. Our deceased siblings in the medical profession doctors, nurses and midwives numbered ten. That is a big blow for medical service provision which is always in dire need of personnel whether in active service or otherwise.

All of them served humanity as best as they could before retiring. Their good works spoke volumes. Akora Dr Lucy Pobee always made for time for her other passions, singing and dancing and she will always be remembered for her dance moves and singing inspite of her advanced age. She was a valued member of the Akora Choir and attended almost every Achimota event. It was always a joy to see her ... and the pain of her passing will live with us for ages.

Four teachers and lecturers left their class or lecture rooms forever on heavenly assignments. Historians are needed as part of the preparations towards the centenary celebrations of Achimota School and it is painful to accept that one slipped through our fingers to eternity.



- * Akora Rosina Attoh Korkoi Konuah née Vanderpuye of the 1940 Year Group was born on 16th January 1922. She was educated at Wesley School and was the 936th student to enroll at Prince of Wales College where she made some good and lasting friendships. Her bond with Akora Elsie Sowah (née Djarbanor) was remarkable. Akora Rosina passed the Cambridge School Certificate in 1940, making her a member of the 1940 Year Group. She gained entry to the then Dispensing School at Korle-Bu after much difficulty because she was a female and became one of the first four to enrol. They passed out in 1946. In 1947 to 1949 she trained as a State Registered Nurse in UK and worked as a nurse and pharmacist till she retired. Akora Rosina cared for a lot of priests and they in turn looked out for her. She got married to Allotei Kobina Konuah and were blessed with four children 9 grandchildren and 9 great-grandchildren.
- * Akora Letitia Eva Obeng of the 1946 Year Group was born in Anum on January 10, 1925, one of eight children of the Very Rev Emmanuel Victor Asihene and Mrs. Dora Asihene. Akora Letitia attended Achimota College in 1939. She got married to Akora George Obeng and they had three children. During her 98 years on this earth, Akora Letitia became the first woman to achieve many things including: First research staff of the National Research Council for Ghana; First PhD holder in science in Ghana; first to establish and run the Institute of Aquatic Biology; first Director of the Regional Office for Africa at UNEP; First Fellow and first President of the Ghana Academy of Arts and Sciences. She was a recipient of the Order of the Star of Ghana (Member) and honorary degrees from KNUST and the Liverpool School of Tropical Medicine. She was a person of strength, integrity, faith, culture, character and an inspiration to all.

- ***** Akora Theodore Komla Agbenyike Agble of the 1949 Year Group was born 21st July 1931. After his primary school education in Hohoe he proceeded to Achimota School up to O Levels, spending one term at Mfantispim for A Levels before he was admitted to the University College of the Gold Coast. He was offered a scholarship to study medicine at Aberdeen University, and returned to Ghana. Two years later he specialized in Obs and Gynae in the UK. Akora Agble got married to Yolande née Garraway, and had four sons. As well as working in GB and Ghana Akora Agble spent over 13 years in Saudi Arabia. He passed away peacefully at his home in Kent, England on Monday April 24th 2023, and was survived by his widow, four sons, four grandchildren, brother and extended family. His autobiography, which contains many interesting anecdotes about his beloved Achimota, is available on Amazon and Barnes and Noble, USA as My Story by Dr. T K Agble.
- * Akora Samuel Ofosu Ofosu-Amaah (OAA 1949) was born on January 13, 1931. He attended Government Boys' School, Achimota School and Mfantsipim. He earned his B. Sc. from University College of Gold Coast and his MBChB from the University of Glasgow. On completing his housemanship in internal medicine and paediatrics he returned to Ghana and worked in the Paediatrics Department at Korle Bu Hospital. He earned his Master's in Public Health from Harvard University and became Head of Community Health Department of the Medical School. He joined UNICEF in 1984, not counting his other accolades. He was the family genealogist, a trailblazer, a technologist, an astronomer, and a veritable polymath. He passed away on 22nd January 2023, survived by his wife, Virginia Akwele Ofosu-Amaah (née Engmann); brother, Prof. G.K.A Ofosu-Amaah, two daughters S. Naa Abia Casely-Hayford; F Nana Ofosu-Amaah and a son, William Nii Amaah Ofosu-Amaah.

- * Akora Doris Owusu-Addo née Sarkodee-Adoo was a member of the OAA 1950 Year Group, Slessor House. After leaving Achimota School she later went on to study Law at the University of Hull, successfully passing the UK Bar exam before returning to work at the Attorney General's Department in Ghana in the late 1950's. She later transitioned to the Judicature where she became Ghana's second female judge of the High Court of Ghana. She was survived by her widower Prof John Owusu-Addo and 4 children, 2 of who are Akoras.
- * Akora Lucy Mary Pobee (née Mensah) of the 1952 Year Group was born on 13th December 1933. She attended Achimota School from 1947 to 1952. She returned for 6th Form, was elected House Prefect in 1953, and Senior Girls' Prefect in 1954. Akora Lucy got her medical degree at London Royal Free Hospital in 1961 and got married to her husband there in Britain. The couple returned to Ghana to settle down. She practiced medicine in the Government and private sectors and retired in 2017. Akora Lucy mentored women in her profession and outside it. She was a founding member of the Medical Women Association of Ghana and a member of the Board of Governors of Achimota School in the 1980's. She was an active member of the OAA and the OAA Choir. Akora Lucy passed away on 21st June 2023 survived by 4 children, 4 siblings, 8 grandchildren and several "adopted" children.



- * Akora Georgina Kingsley Nyinah (née Anim-Addo) of the 1952 Year Group was Charming and enchanting by nature, everyone who knew Akora Georgina remembers her fondly with a smile and a ready anecdote illustrating her extraordinary personality, intelligent, hardworking, adventurous, engaging, humorous, with a wicked wit and zest for life. Her warmth and compassion matched the strength of her indomitable spirit and her ability to persevere and prevail over life's challenges. Georgina's caring, nurturing, and generosity touched everyone who came under her roof as well as anyone she came into contact with, regardless of their background or station. Retiring unbeaten at the age of 44 in 1976 as the National Ladies Singles title holder. In August 2019, she was amongst the first group of tennis champions to be inducted into Ghana's Tennis Hall of Fame.Georgina lived her life as child of God. As a teacher, business woman, wife, mother, grandmother, great grandmother, sister, and friend; she was an inspiration! Truly, living water to a thirsty land!
- * Akora Samuel Bortei-Doku was the 6th of 7 children. He attended the Presbyterian Boys' Secondary School and further obtained his Cambridge Higher School Cert from Achimota School and became Livingstone House prefect. He was a math lecturer at UCC and later helped spearhead a project at the Presbyterian Church of Ghana to synchronize the Ga, Ewe and Twi hymnals. He was married to Margaret Bortei-Doku (1946-2015) and is survived by his 6 children: Lumo '85, Tieku (Presec '86), Oko '88, Akwele '88, Akwete '99 and Akuete '99. May his soul rest in perfect peace.



- ***** Akora Elizabeth Abba Bruce-Tagoe née Bruce-Konuah of 1955 Year Group, was born on 5th August 1937. She attended Government Girls' School in Accra and completed her O' and A' Levels at Achimota School in 1957. She graduated with a Bachelor of Science MBBS (London) degree and worked at Korle Bu Hospital before attending the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine and obtained a diploma in Public Health. She worked at the Paediatric Unit of University College, London, Korle Bu Polyclinic, Nurses' Training College, the Office of the Regional Medical Officer of Health, Greater Accra in charge of Maternal and Child Health Services until she was appointed as the District Medical Officer of Accra and the Metropolitan Director of Health Services, Accra Metropolitan Assembly. She retired on 4th August 1997 and passed away on 31st December 2022, survived by her widower Akora Alexander Akufo Bruce-Tagoe, four children and eight grandchildren.
- * Akora Sylvia Akushia Odoi was born on 4th July, 1935 in Accra. She had her primary education at the Government Girls' School. She went on to Wesley Girls' High School but had to be transferred to Achimota School after a protracted illness. She was accepted into a 4-year course in Occupational Therapy in Dorset House, School of Occupational Therapy in Oxford. She was the second African girl to be given that opportunity. She rose to become the Principal Occupational Therapist of the Accra and Pantang Mental Hospitals. She was the Vice President of the 1955 Year Group.



- * Akora Elizabeth Adzoa Obeng of the 1957 Year Group was born on 3rd September 1934 and passed away on 11th March 2023 at the age of 88 years. She trained as a nurse at the Okomfo Anokye Hospital and worked at Korle Bu Teaching Hospital, Ho Hospital and Hohoe Hospital. Akora Elizabeth studied midwifery and received a Diploma in Nursing from University of Ghana. Akora Elizabeth worked at Achimota Hospital, Ridge Hospital, Kete Krachi Hospital and Margaret Marquardt Hospital, Kpando. She retired in 1992. She was the mother of Akora Biadela Yao Hodasi (1979 Year Group), Belinda Hodasi Jones (1985 Year Group), Evelyn Obeng and Jessica Kalera Afia Opal. She left behind six grandchildren, Akora Jennifer Candreia, Kevin Candreia. Michael Candreia, Akora Denzel Kofi Hodasi, Kadija Jones and Kojo Jones. She was also survived by one great--grandchild
- * Akora Mrs. Victoria Lamiorkor Coke, née Blavo was born on 9th March 1939 in Accra. She started her primary education at the Government Girls' School in Accra and continued to Achimota School, Slessor house. Upon completion in 1957, she enrolled at the Nurses Training School, Korle-Bu in 1958 and qualified as a State Registered Nurse in 1961. She continued further with specialisation in Paediatric nursing in Edinburgh, Scotland, where she qualified as a Registered Sick Children Nurse (RSCN). She then returned to work at the Children's Block, Korle Bu Teaching Hospital until her retirement in 1999. Akora Victoria Coke passed away on 15th September 2023. Akora Victoria Coke got married to the late Akora Dr Seymour Arthur Yoku Coke in April 1966. She was blessed with 4 children all of who survived her.



- # Akora Kathlyn Penante Perpetual Naa Attoh-Korkoi Ababio was born on 24th, November, 1939. She attended the Bishop Girls' School in Accra; and then Achimota School. She resided in Kingsley House and was a member of the OAA 1958 Year Group. She trained as a nurse at Korle Bu Hospital, graduated as a Registered Nurse in 1961 and worked there until she went to the UK and obtained a certificate in midwifery at the Queen Charlotte Memorial Hospital, London. She continued her training and was awarded a diploma in midwifery at the Elizabeth Hospital in Birmingham, UK. Akora Kathlyn trained and worked as a nursing tutor before relocating to Ghana. She started work at Pat's Maternity Home, Koforidua, providing midwifery services for women and practical training for midwifery students. She served as the President of the Ghana Registered Midwives Association (GRMA) and Chairperson of the Eastern Region Chapter of the GRMA for 8 years. She was a member of St. Peter's Anglican Cathedral Church, Koforidua and was a member of the Guild of St. Mary, Women's Fellowship and a chorister.
- * Akora Edwin Faustus Egya Emmil Wood was born at Sempe in Accra on the 12th of May 1941. He attended Government Boys' Junior School at Sempe, Government Boys' Senior School, Rowe Road, and Achimota School where he resided in Lugard House. He gained admission to the London School of Economics at the University of London graduating with a Bsc. (Economics) in 1967. He worked with Cooper Brothers & Read Co. Ltd in London before returning to Ghana in 1971. Upon his return to Ghana, he joined the National Investment Bank where he rose through the ranks and retired in 1996 as Executive Director of the Bank. Akora Wood was a personable man, kind and generous to a fault and loved by all who knew him. He was called to eternal rest on the 27th of July, 2023, survived by his widow, Her Ladyship Justice Georgina Theodora Wood (Rtd).

- * Akora George Ferguson Edward Gardiner was born on Sunday 24th March, 1946 in Freetown, Sierra Leone. His primary school education was at the University of Ghana Demonstration School in Legon, from where he entered Achimota School in 1957. His secondary education continued in Addis Ababa and ended at Cranford School in Britain. Cambridge University came next from where he graduated as a Lawyer in 1969. His work life started in Ghana with the Korah Chambers, Lyles Quarshie Idun Chambers before joining Duncan Gilbey and Matheson Wines and Spirits as Administrative Manager. This position took him to Sierra Leone and Nigeria. He returned to Ghana as the Lawyer for the Ghana Highway Authority until 1975 when he moved to Nigeria. He relocated to Accra in 1986 when he became the Company Secretary of the Atlantic Port Services in Tema, eventually joined Dan Opoku Acheampong Chambers. He became a Lay Preacher at the Ghana Ridge Church, and served as President of the Greater Accra Branch of the Ghana Bar Association. He retired in 2022. He is survived by four children.
- * Akora Geoffrey Brux-Cornelius Kwame Addam of the 1961 Year Group was born on Saturday, 26th August, 1939 at Peki. His early education was in Kadjebi from where he went to Achimota on a full scholarship in 1957. After excelling in the A'Level Exams he preceded to KNUST where he obtained a Bachelors Degree in Mechanical Engineering. He joined the Ghana Broadcasting Cooperation and was sent to the University of Prague, Czechoslovakia for a Masters Degree in Film Production. He returned to Ghana and spent the rest of his working life there, retiring in 2022. He lived in Peki until August 12th, 2023 when he passed on after a short illness. He was survived by 6 children and 8 grandchildren.

- ***** Akora Joana Abena Adobe Ofori of the 1961 Year Group was born on Tuesday, 27th October, 1942 in Koforidua. Her Primary and Middle School education were at Peki Girls School, from where she entered Achimota School in 1957. She obtained her BA and Masters Degrees at the University of Cape Coast, and became a Teacher at the Ghana National Secondary School in Koforidua. In 1975 she was transferred to the Head Office of the GES in Accra. In 1980 she went to Niger on an Exchange Program as a Lecturer in English at the University of Niger. She returned to Ghana in 1990 and worked as the Assistant District Director of Education at Amasaman. She was promoted to the rank of District Director of Education for Accra and retired in 2005. She was instrumental in the establishment of the Mile 7 Salvation Congregation of the Presbyterian Church in Accra. She passed away on Tuesday, 12th September, 2023 after a short illness. She was survived by a many Grand Sons, and daughter and two and Great grandchildren.
- ***** Akora Ernest Kweku Appiah Odoom Of the 1962 Year Group was born on 17th June, 1943 at Breman Asikuma, Central Region. He started his education at the Breman Asikuma Methodist Primary School, Laterbiokorshie and Abossey-Okai Presbyterian Primary and Middle Schools respectively before entering Achimota School. He became the first headmaster of the nascent Breman Asikuma Secondary School, then obtained a degree in History from the University of Ghana, Legon (1968), a Post Graduate Certificate in Education from Cape Coast University College (1970), a Masters Degree from University of Ife, Nigeria (1981) and a Certificate of Attendance of Higher Educational Programme from Manchester University, U.K. He worked in various organizations in education and retired as senior Assistant Registrar, WAEC and Registrar, Catholic University College. He passed away on 18th July, 2023 survived by his widow, 6 children and 15 grandchildren.

- * Akora Naa Techiwa Karikari née Okine of the 1962 Year Group was born on 3rd November, 1944 in Accra. She had her basic education at the Anumle Primary School, Achimota, Mmbofra Turo School in Kumasi and Achimota School on 7th January, 1958 her secondary education. After her start successful to completion of Form 5 in 1962 with the award of the West African School Certificate, she pursued further studies in Edinburgh. Scotland, and trained as a Nurse. She undertook her specialist training programme in Sheffield, England, where she was employed as an Occupational Health Nurse for the City Council and then as a Senior Occupational Health Nurse of the City's Fire and Rescue Service. She returned to Ghana in September, 2007. She was an active member of the 1962 Year Group and passed away on 22nd January, 2023, survived by her 2 children, 3 stepchildren and 2 grandchildren.
- * Akora Yaa Achiaa Agyeman was born on the 4th of October 1945 to Akora J.O.T Agyeman, and Mrs Felicia Agyeman, both of blessed memory. She entered Achimota School and was assigned to Kingsley House. She was a very active member of the 1963 Year Group. She went on to continue her education in Switzerland and later came back to Ghana, where she worked with various Government and private organizations including GNTC. She was very active in her Year Group and never missed a meeting. She was well-loved for her peace-loving, kind, compassionate and outgoing nature. She was married to Akora Seth Kwasi Dei, who predeceased her and is survived by her children, Akora Ohene-Kofi Dei and Akora Nana Ama Obeaku Dei.



- * Akora Seth Kwasi Dei was born on the 20th of February 1945. In 1959, he gained admission into Achimota School, and was assigned to Gyamfi House. He was a recipient of a United States scholarship for high school students and attended Buxton School, Williamstown, Massachusetts and Cornell University, Upstate New York. He returned to West Africa and set up LeaseAfric, a leasing company in Ivory Coast and in Ghana. He also collaborated with some European partners to set up Blue Skies, which produce cut fresh fruit and juice. He loved his alma mater and was a very active member of the 1963 Year Group. His amiable and self-effacing personality allowed him to make friends with people from all walks of life and from all over the world.
